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Asylum Seekers: Some Myths and Truths...

The myth: Asylum seekers jump the queue when it comes to admission to schools and harm the education of local children

The truth: The children of asylum seekers are subject to the same admission rules as any other UK residents.

The myth: Asylum seekers come to Britain and are immediately given free homes and full benefits

The truth: They are not allowed to claim welfare benefits. Asylum seekers benefits are paid by central government's National Asylum Support Service (NASS) and not from local council taxes, this is to cover their accommodation and support costs. A national report of asylum seekers and refugees, revealed 85% experience hunger, 95% cannot afford to buy clothes or shoes and 80% are not able to maintain their wellbeing.

The myth: Asylum seekers are a drain on the economy

The truth: After initial barriers such as the ability to speak English and the recognition of overseas qualifications are overcome, refugees can make a valuable contribution as professionals, tax payers and as active members of their local community.

The myth: Asylum seekers are linked to rising crime

The truth: In every community there are always a few members that ruin it for the rest and asylum seekers or refugees are no exception. However, a report published by the Association of Chief Police Officers (ACPO) confirmed that there is no evidence for a higher rate of criminality among refugees and asylum seekers. Asylum seekers are less likely to commit major crimes than British citizens, as this would affect their asylum application. In fact they are more likely to become victims of crime in the UK.

Our Services Dealt with 855 Cases

During the course of three months, from August to end of October this year, our charity dealt with 855 cases. Iraqi Association users come from different London Boroughs, for this period, the top three London Boroughs were, Hammersmith and Fulham of 153 individuals, this followed by Ealing of 115 individuals, then Brent of 67 individuals. The breakdown of our help with our charity users during August, September and October of this year covers the following categories.

From the above data, Iraqi Association users were 387 Males and 308 Females. Age Ranges were between 10 - 85 years. The Greater London area is not the only source of our clients, however, we equally serve people from outer London area, such as Hastings, Eastbourne, Cardiff, Birmingham, Manchester...etc. from the above data, we have assisted 37 outer London people during the course of the above period. The truth: Asylum seekers are NOT entitled to council housing. Accommodation and support for people seeking asylum is provided by a private organisation under contract with the Home Office.

Haj Najim the Grocer Movie

On 16th October, the Iraqi Association screened this film, directed by Amer Alwan. Music Ahmed Acanthosis and starring Sami Kaftan, also participated in the film a number of Iraqi and British actors. The film took part in several Arab and international film festivals and won the award for best Arab film in Rabat Film Festival in Morocco. It is about the Najaf revolution in 1918 during the British occupation of Iraq, addressing the life story of one of the symbols of the revolution, Haj Najim the grocer. The Movie attended by 80 people.
